In his book 'The Weight of Glory', CS Lewis states, 'Good philosophy must exit if for no other reason than because bad philosophy needs to be answered. The learned life then, is, for some, a duty.'

It was claimed that in fifty years he circulated over one million copies of scriptures, many millions of tracts and two million copies of devotional books such as Spurgeon's Morning by Morning and Evening by Evening."

George Angus started banks and companies, supported schools, and was a leading figure in the fight to protect the rights of Indigenous people in Australia and New Zealand.

Adelaide Christian Schools has embraced this 'learned life'. We have adopted the above statement and George Angus' 'heart', wanting to influence the culture through quality Christian education in the state and beyond.

Maturity is the word that frames 2024. Our less experienced leaders have matured and have 5+ years of leadership experience, while the more experienced leaders continue to gather valuable insights and take on extra responsibility.



As I reflect on 2024, I do so with deep gratitude—for the unity of our team, the support of our families, and the many moments where God's hand was evident. This report offers a glimpse into the key highlights of the year and the heart behind all we do at Sunrise.

LIFE OF THE SCHOOL

Student Development and Achievement

In 2024, Sunrise Christian School Fullarton has continued to see encouraging growth in student development and academic achievement. As noted on the My School website, 22% of our students had English as an additional language. That number has risen to 29% in 2025, highlighting the increasing cultural diversity within our community.

To support this growth, we have implemented targeted educational programs and classroom support for our EAL students. These initiatives have led to significant improvements not only in academic progress but also in student wellbeing and peer connection. We have observed stronger engagement, improved communication, and increased confidence in social and learning environments.

Our commitment to strengthening core learning areas has also resulted in a 9.7% improvement in literacy and numeracy outcomes, reflecting the dedication of our teaching staff and the impact of our whole-school approach to academic excellence.

We give thanks to God for the way He continues to grow each student in wisdom, character, and understanding.



Impact on the community and Our Heart

At the heart of all we do is our desire to be a Christ-centred community that nurtures love, character, and purpose in every child and family we serve. Scripture continues to guide our focus toward cultivating moral excellence and spiritual formation. The words of the Apostle Paul in Philippians 2:15 inspire our posture:

Our focus on educational excellence has borne fruit. In 2024, many of our students achieved top results across a range of academic and extracurricular pursuits, including

music and sport—some progressing to state and national levels. These achievements reflect the strength of our teaching and learning program and our data-informed approach to improving practice. We use rigorous assessment and long-term data tracking to ensure every learner receives the support they need to grow and succeed.

As we look to the future, we remain grateful for our team—a group of passionate, prayerful educators who give their all, working as unto the Lord, to shape young lives and raise a generation of courageous, Christcentred leaders.

School Development

In 2024, Sunrise Christian School Fullarton continued to grow in ways that reflect both vision and faithfulness. A significant milestone was the completion of our Covered Outdoor Learning Area (COLA)—a transformative space now used daily for learning, play, and community gathering. More than just a structure, the COLA provides flexibility in all weather and stands as a reminder of God's provision and our commitment to nurture students academically, socially, and spiritually.

We're grateful for the dedicated leadership of Mr. Mark Nokes and Mr. Anthony Bennett from our Property Maintenance Team, who led the project with excellence. Thank you also to our staff and families for their patience and positivity during the construction.


into the lives of our students and their families. Their unwavering dedication has helped cultivate an environment where children are not only known and loved but also encouraged to grow in wisdom and understanding.

Student enrolments have steadily increased, moving from 152 students last year to 163 at the end of 2024. With wait lists beginning to form for our future reception classes, the future numbers of enrolments appear to be strong into the years to come.

In response to the needs of our growing student body, we were excited to welcome several new staff members to our team, including Mrs Karen Verall, a garden specialist who has brought both passion and purpose to our learning environment. The establishment of the new Garden Program has been a true highlight of the year. This program has not only enhanced our sustainability practices and beautified the school grounds, but





more importantly, it has become a meaningful extension of classroom learning. Students have engaged with hands-on experiences that tie directly into subjects like science, health, and even mathematics, as well as Biblical principles of stewardship, creation care, and gratitude.

We will continue to invest in programs that develop the whole child and to seek ways to partner with families in raising children who are strong in spirit, confident in their identity in Christ, and prepared to make a difference in the world.

We also continue to pray for wisdom, provision, and unity as our school grows. We know that the journey ahead will require faith, collaboration, and a continued reliance on the Lord.

Sunrise Christian School continues to uphold its commitment to providing a holistic Christian education to our students, nurturing their academic, spiritual, and personal development. Our teachers are pivotal in shaping students' lives and influencing their outcomes beyond the classroom. The integration and importance of our Christian faith in learning fosters Godly character development and positive relationships. Teachers are role models of our Christian values and beliefs through personalised attention and mentorship. We educate hearts and minds in Godly wisdom and understanding, specifically in that order, because as Aristotle said in 300 B.C., 'Educating the mind without educating the heart, is no education at all'.

Our partnership with Temple Christian College here at Marion works hand in hand to influence precious lives, from young ELCaged children to Year 9 students. At Sunrise, we educate hearts

and minds in Godly Wisdom and Understanding. This flows nicely into Temple's mission of empowering students to grow in Christian character and service and be a Christ-like influence in the school and broader community. All staff graciously take on the educator role as part of God's calling on their lives.

We employ just under 50 staff members at Marion, including parttime teachers, office staff, and the maintenance crew.

LIFE OF THE SCHOOL

We are a school filled with individuals who have a purpose to influence the next generation with a message of hope, truth and love, using this medium we call education. What a privilege! Scripture guides our focus towards fostering a Christ-centred focus and moral excellence, highlighting the two most important things in life; 'loving God and loving others'. It emphasises virtues such as kindness,



honesty, and empathy, which form the foundation of character.

Eric Liddell, an outspoken Christian athlete in the 1930s, was famous for saying this - God made me fast, and when I run, I feel His pleasure. At Sunrise, every staff member has a God-ordained purpose to influence lives, and it resonated so much when I heard from one staff member the same sentiment as Eric Liddell. 'God made me good at explaining stuff, and when I teach, I feel His pleasure'. Romans 12:1 and 2 says: So here's what I want you to do, God helping you (I urge you): Take your everyday, ordinary life-your sleeping, eating, going-to-work, and walking-around life-and place it before God as an offering.

Our theme for the year was 'Transformation'. For our staff. the transformation started with themselves and then naturally flowed down to the students they teach, which was the 'offering' we placed before God.

Scripture is central to community life, starting with staff devotions





each morning, where staff unite to worship, read God's Word and participate in a time of prayer. The school week begins similarly for our student community with an assembly where God's Word is taught and a time of singing where worship is enjoyed. This is also a time to recognise students' achievement in several areas of their growth at school, like character, academic, sports or drama achievements. Classes start the day with devotions, enjoy daily Bible reading, a memory verse programme across the grades is practised, and a weekly character quality is highlighted. Primary students finish most Fridays with an assembly where classes share and take turns leading.

Teachers had the opportunity to engage in meaningful professional development throughout the year, starting with a 4-day intensive where all Sunrise schools come together as a unit. At the start of Term 3. we also engaged in professional development with all the Christian schools in South Australia through CSA (Christian Schools Australia), plus another day of Sunrisespecific PD. These days, together as educators, are essential for building each other up in faith, strengthening our relationships and honing our knowledge of 'good practice' in education.

Once again, each student's rigorous standardised testing regime took place in literacy and numeracy, allowing us to track these critical areas. Utilising the ACER Progressive Achievement Tests and various other literacy and numeracy tests, we have collated the assessment data in a software tool called the Student Performance Analyser. This assists

us in tracking individual and cohort data over the years a student is at Sunrise Christian School, ensuring accountability for a student's progress and an opportunity to review our programme.

Literacy Evening

We provide an opportunity for all our new families to begin the year with a BBQ and a run-down of what we provide to our students in the area of literacy unique to Sunrise.

Open Day

A big part of our marketing plan happens in Term 1 every year, with an Open Day where we invite potential families to come and experience the school. Primary and middle schools combine to create a fantastic night where young and old can join in all different activities and enjoy some food together.

Grand Parents' Day

Honouring and giving gratitude to those who invest in our students' lives

School Musical and Christmas

We are spreading the word of the gospel through the musical "Back to the Beginning" to our community and to be the salt and light in the local community once again. With the Hopgood Theatre in Noarlunga under construction, we had to consolidate our performances with a smaller cohort at Edwadrstown Baptist Church.

Our junior primary students did not miss out on any performance opportunities, as they had a chance to showcase their talent at the endof-year Carols performance.

Grade 6

Grade 6s at the Marion site participated in the annual Stewardship project. They were given \$20 and encouraged to "make it grow" by creating, marketing, and selling a product during selling day opportunities in Term 2.

The Grade 6 year culminated in another Sunrise tradition - the End of Year Dinner. It was fantastic to have had our parents organise a beautiful event that the students would remember long after finishing Primary School.

We competed in various sporting codes, from Athletics and Cross Country to Basketball, Netball, Soccer and Table Tennis. In addition, there were many opportunities to compete in interschool sporting activities and the state-wide SACSA competitions.

Music

Music is another one of God's gifts to us. In addition to weekly worship times in school assemblies and class devotions, the students learn about music in their weekly lessons. In Grades 6,7 and 8, we offer an Instrumental Program where students can choose from 4 band instruments and learn to play them in a small group context. The four instruments are the saxophone, flute, trombone, and trumpet. The intention is to promote a music culture that begins in the Sunrise



Upper Primary and builds toward confident ensemble experiences at the middle school level. Ultimately, it will lead to excellent music opportunities at a senior level at Temple Mile End.

As a school, we provide Christian tutors so parents can access specialist tuition for their children in percussion, strings, dance, and piano. Music and the Arts are also showcased through the school's End-of-Year Musical. Particular opportunities are given to senior students with key roles and responsibilities in each of the productions.

Other Highlights

At Sunrise Marion, our LOTE subject for 2024 was Japanese. However, as required, we follow the Australian Curriculum learning patterns and achieve good outcomes across the school. Scripture passages are learnt in Japanese with iPads used to record oral speech for assessment, practice, and development.

Class camps are a real highlight for our students. These memorable experiences proved to be an opportunity to learn vital life skills beyond the classroom. Camps start in Grade 3 with a Friday night sleepover at Adelaide Zoo and then move to a 3-day camp in Grades 4 and 5. Two or three schools combine for these camps to build unity and friendship across the Sunrise locations. Various senior teachers are assigned to coordinate these camps, and this role helps facilitate their growth as leaders.

Our Year 6 students had the opportunity to go back to Canberra in 2024. It was another memorable experience, with the new opportunity to visit the snowfields on the outskirts of Canberra.

Our middle school students participated in an all-in camp and had the privilege of spending a week at a campground on the York Peninsula. The Rite Journey is now in its 5th year, and our dedicated staff helped our Grade 9 students navigate this 'rite of passage' from childhood to adulthood with enthusiasm and a sense of purpose. It focuses on "owning" the transformation from youth to adulthood and gives excellent scope for input from a Christian perspective.

The usual end-of-year presentation evenings for the Primary and Middle Schools continued. Still, as a growing school, we decided to have two separate evenings, with ELC to Grade 2 together and Grades 3-9 on a different evening. These were great opportunities to recognise the character, academic, sporting, and artistic accomplishments of our student body.

As is customary, a provision was made to celebrate the graduation of the Grade 6s and Year 9s with a special certificate and gift from the school.

STAFFING

The dedication of our teachers to embodying Christian principles significantly impacts student outcomes at Sunrise Christian School. Together, through our commitment to Christian education, we continue to inspire and empower future leaders grounded in faith and knowledge. With a total staff of about 50, we have an incredible cohort of talented personalities committed to working with parents to see their students grow in understanding God's world and Word.

The staff and students have access to a range of technology in the classroom, from Samsung 75" Non-Touch 4K Panels with Apple 4K TVs attached, MacBook Air, student iPads and simple robotics. Junior Primary students can access two trollies of 30 iPads, and students from Grades 4-6 can participate in a one-to-one iPad program. The teachers regularly use electronic devices and platforms such as SEQTA, SPA, and SharePoint to plan and present lessons and manage data collected from the learning process and assessments. They prepare for excursions and camps using the Child Safe Online system, which not only manages induction and risk analysis of all those who work with the children but also provides collected information such as phone numbers, policies and medical information to be available both at school and off-site when the need arises.

Our teaching staff participated in six days of in-school professional development (PD) and various days of outsourced PD that focused mainly on the philosophy of Christian education, classroom expectations, JP Literacy, and Mathematics. In addition, all staff participated in First Aid training.

DIVERSE EDUCATION

Throughout 2024, the diverse needs of the students at Marion were ever-changing, fluid and flexible. New enrolments and new diagnoses presented new situations to manage, and I applaud Mrs Williams and the Diverse Ed staff for their willingness to change regularly to accommodate our students' needs by modifying the support given. The team is enthusiastic and eager to improve what we do. Having such dedicated people working with our most vulnerable students is a privilege.

With the influx of new students throughout the year, the BLITZ program proved to be a successful intervention program. It helped new students improve their knowledge of phonics and spelling, their ability to read fluently, and their ability to use phonograms accurately in their writing. Identifying, reviewing, and reporting against goals set by a teacher has also improved tracking students' progress over the year.

Sunrise Marion has a very diverse student cohort. The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD) census in August indicates where extra support is given to our student cohort. This additional support is highly effective, and we continue exploring ways to manage this optimally and improve our practice.







WORKPLACE HEALTH AND SAFETY

Ensuring our students and staff's safety and well-being are paramount. Over the past year, we have steadfastly committed to maintaining a safe and secure learning environment. We have cultivated a safety culture permeating every aspect of our

school community through adherence to updated fire safety protocols, first aid training, and mandatory reporting procedures.

Staff work tirelessly to implement and uphold all standards, ensuring all community members feel secure and supported. Each weekly staff meeting reviews one safety area, and a local WHS representative completes a termly checklist and attends a schoolspecific WHS meeting. In addition, each volunteer is inducted and registered in our Child Safe Online program. This safety management software programme is critical in risk management for off-campus activities.

IN CLOSING

In closing, Sunrise Christian School Marion passed all criteria in the Education Standards Board selfaudit during Term 3. This was a significant process, and thanks must go out to all our principals and staff across our Sunrise schools for their hard work and dedication to see this come to fruition.

Sunrise Christian School Marion is not just another Christian school but a place where every child matters every day. Staff dedicate their lives to seeing young people's hearts touched. I am witness to this fact of lives being changed on a daily basis.

People are central to our business, and influencing them for God's glory gives us purpose and a sense of satisfaction. It is a privilege to be part of an incredible team at Sunrise Marion.

The relationship with Temple Christian College continued to strengthen, especially regarding leadership and teaching staff engagement. The support of many key staff at Mile End for their Marion colleagues has been critical and is much appreciated.

The Middle School is thankful to Marcel Rijken, Principal of Temple Christian College, and Phil Paterson for skillfully negotiating all things Middle School.

I want to thank Mr Kym Golding, our CEO of Adelaide Christian Schools, for his guidance and leadership, along with the other Sunrise Principals and Coordinators for their dedication and character. I would also like to thank Mark Nokes and the Central Services Team for overseeing our excellent reputation from a financial and business perspective. Thank you to each of our board members for your dedication, pravers and quidance throughout 2024.

We are looking forward to what lies ahead in 2025.

STAFFING

2024 started in difficult circumstances after the resignation of the middle school / sports coordinator at the end of 2023 as well as a long-term staff member resigning in January 2024 for health reasons. This meant some late January shuffling to fill classroom positions, including several part-time roles from relief teachers and parttime staff increasing their FTE load. At the end of Term 1, these relief positions needing filling again, and we were thankful to have a more stable teaching team from Term 2 onwards as things began to settle.

The addition of an extra bus run from Penola meant two bus drivers were required after the resignation of the chaplain / Lucindale bus driver. Through much prayer, appeals, and negotiation, we managed to contract two local Christian bus drivers for these bus runs, which stabilised from Term 2.

Tania Jennings continued in the primary coordinator and diverse education coordinator roles, and Kate Gale took on the middle school coordinator role.

We were most thankful to appoint a woodwork teacher in Semester Two, after a number of several years of searching. This teacher travels from Mt Gambier each Wednesday, to work with the middle school classes.

Staff Development

Staff development began in the January PD Week, where staff were refreshed on the 'Sunrise vision' that underpins the pedagogy and philosophy for Sunrise. Staff also worked on inclusive curriculum (diverse education), reading records, maths challenge activities, time management and a wellbeing workshop, as well as several elective sessions linked to subject areas.

Staff continued to work collaboratively on unit plans and overviews across in their grade level with teachers from other sites. Individual staff identified professional development opportunities in their respective roles, including a focus on food technology, visual arts, textiles, digital technology and more.

Other local professional training undertaken during the year included first aid CPR refresher, The Resilience Project, and the CSA mid-year conference on the theme of 'Who Are We Becoming?' Regular staff meeting training focussed on 'The Sunrise Way' document and its application across the life of the school.

Our school theme for 2024 was 'In His Image' from Genesis 1:27, and the staff encouraged students in this vision, that they are people of utmost dignity not because of what they can do, but because of who they belong to. This then undergirded conversations around value, respect and dignity across the school.

Community Events

It is exciting to celebrate community events within the life of the school, and 2024 was no different.

The parent coffee mornings (served by the Grade 9/10 hospitality team) moved to Wednesdays, linking with the whole school run, which provided a great boost to numbers. The school librarian created a parent resources book stand, allowing parents to borrow resources that support them and their children. Linked to this, several special coffee mornings were held, such as 'Coffee with a Cop', 'Coffee with a Nurse' and 'Coffee with a Councillor' to link in with the local community.

Also on Wednesday mornings, our chaplain. Kiara Price, started a breakfast club to build discussion and rapport with students over toast and jam. It has certainly built great atmosphere and school community each Wednesday morning.

Grandparents' Day was celebrated in June, the theme being 'A Love of Learning', where students would learn and appreciate what learning looked like for their grandparents. The Grade 9/10 barista-students served a special morning tea of jam and scones with coffee or tea as grandparents enjoyed a variety of students' musical pieces. The grandparents then walked around and witnessed what learning looked like in 2024 for their grandchildren, with many special photos taken and memories made.

Science Week was a fantastic opportunity to celebrate all things science. Students participated in over 20 interactive activities

and experiments, hosted by the Grade 9/10 home group, ESOs and teachers.

Mrs Bettina Palma, our librarian, brought in many exciting initiatives to Book Week, including special class sessions with author of 'Frieda' and 'The Worry Tree', Marianne Musgrove, lunchtime activities, a book stall, and the iconic Book Week parade to finish the week.

Our school had the privilege of connecting with community at both the Remembrance Day and Anzac Day commemorations in the Naracoorte Town Square, where members of the Student Leadership Team were able to lead a scripture reading and lay a wreath on behalf of the school.

Promotion / Marketing

Working closely with the marketing team in Adelaide, the school hosted several promotional events, including the Twilight Tour in February, Lucindale Field Days stall in March, 'Why Choose Sunrise' (aimed at Reception intake) in May. and regional Sunrise Information Evenings in May / June. Regular Principal Tours are conducted once to twice-a-term. In addition, the online presence of Sunrise Naracoorte is increasing through the school's open Facebook page with regular stories and advertising. In 2024, the addition of online parent and student testimonials was wellreceived.

The school has continued to work on its strong relationships with its local newsprint, including Limestone Coast Today and The News, both in advertising and sending local stories to the paper, several of which received front page coverage.

Storytime

Mrs Kristy Marshall and her loyal volunteers continue to implement Storytime for families and children up to 5 years of age. Attendances continued to be low in 2024, and the decision was made to re-start the programme in 2025 with an educational focus on the Early Years Learning Framework. This is such a valuable program for our community, especially in making connections with families of preschool aged children.

Student Leadership Team

The Student Leadership Team (SLT) is comprised of student leaders in all classes from Grade 2 and upwards, headed up by two Grade 6 Senior Ambassadors and two Grade 9/10 School Captains. The SLT in 2024 worked on goals for the year and activities to achieve them. They conducted several fundraising initiatives towards both local (aged care) and international missions, including the Bethel School in PNG.

The students participated in the GRIP Leadership conference in Mt Gambier, the Lucindale Field Days stall, Anzac and Remembrance Day commemorations, casual days, hosting the Colour Run, and they ran a successful whole school games night in Term 3 (where students competed in their sports day teams) and speaking at the Presentation Evening in Term 4.

Sport

The year was off to a great start with the school's 'Whole School Sports Day' now in its third year. This event is a combined effort of the Parent Group and the school staff to bring together this occasion in Term 1. Students were divided into four teams and participated in a range of sports events and fun activities, for points, before the 70m sprints in the middle of the day. The day then moves to the athletics events for Grade 3 and above, before closing with the tug-of-war and presentations.

Students at Naracoorte can participate in both SAPSASA and SACSA representative sports, and we had several students compete in athletics, cross country, football, netball, tennis, swimming, basketball and more. Mr Sean Speed, the sport coordinator, ran extra after-school training sessions for the athletics programme.

The other big sporting event for Term 1 was the Sunrise Athletics Carnival, where Grade 4-6 students enjoyed competing. The Premier's Be Active Challenge ran in Term 2, before Auskick ran in Term 3, with help from the local SANFL liaison. A Sporting Schools grant was used to run football clinics in this same term.

We also participated in the local school netball and football competitions.

The Arts

Students have received many opportunities to participate the exercises across 'The Arts' in 2024. This has included workshops from the State Opera of South Australia, The 'Stations of the Cross' Easter art presentation, two concerts from Christian children's entertainer, Sean W Smith, a concert from the JAM band ('Just Add Music'), the junior primary attending the theatre show 'When the Mirror Bird Sings' as well as local events such as Harmony Day and the South East Primary Schools' Music Festival (choir), and the finale to the year, the whole school musical, 'In a Galilee Far, Far Away', encompassing students from across all year levels.

Middle School

One of the main highlights of 2024 for the middle school was their Grampians camp in early Term 4. Students spent a week seeing the sights and participating in some exciting activities, such as high ropes course, canoeing, rock climbing, abseiling, archery, bushwalking, and two special day trips – one to Halls Gap and one to Sovereign Hill. It's hoped we can continue to offer these exciting camps to retain middle school enrolments.

The Rite Journey ran in 2024 for the Grade 9/10 class. Students embarked on their year-long journey with the Departure Ceremony in Term 1 before participating in a series of challenges and mentoring experiences over the year, including 'The Abyss' (solo camp). Students finished the year with a special Homecoming Ceremony with family and friends as they showcased their mentor project.

Our middle school students continue to have access to a wide variety of community-linked electives on a Wednesday afternoon. In 2024, this included electives at the Naracoorte Kindergarten, The Sheep's Back Museum, and in the fields of barista coffee, arm wrestling, Lego Mindstorms, recycled jewellery, 3D printing, visual art, pottery, deadlifting, chess, metalwork, woodwork, small engine maintenance, textiles and guitar.

The Grade 9/10 hospitality team have helped a variety of events across the school year, including Twilight Tour, promotional events, Grandparents' Day, Book Week, Shrove Tuesday, and much more.



Camps

In addition to the excellent middle school camp to the Grampians, students in the primary school continued to access camps to Adare (Gr 4), Wirraway (Gr 5), Adelaide Zoo and Canberra (Gr 6). We were fortunate to receive positive social media publicity through our local state and federal members of parliament on our Grade 6 camps.

DIVERSE EDUCATION

Tania Jennings continued in the role of diverse education coordinator from Term 3. She led staff in a greater focus on the need for evidence of support for the National Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD), as well as implementation of the QuickSmart maths programme for differentiation across the school. Subsequently, in staff meetings each team (middle school and primary school) focussed on diverse education, including Individualised Learning Plans (ILPs), adjustment forms and ensuring accurate records

are being kept for all supplementary and substantial-level students. **Education Support Officers are now** keeping records of their sessions as further evidence of the support students are receiving.

WORKPLACE HEALTH AND SAFETY

Staff development and compliances, WHS audits and training were completed, and no significant incidents were recorded.

CAPITAL DEVELOPMENTS

Over the course of 2024 we were able to see the kitchen garden project begin to take shape. Beginning with pathways, planter beds, irrigation and compost bays, the next installation was the butterfly-shaped shade structure, fencing, and the greenhouse. The project did take on some delays with the unavailability of tradespeople, but it was good to begin using the produce from the garden in the latter stages of 2024.

IN CLOSING

2024 was a year of consolidation after the leadership change in mid-2023. Many experiences still feel 'new' as staff and I worked together in our first full year together. The goal I outlined at the beginning of

the year was to continue to 'love God and love our neighbours', always remembering the missional focus for our school. I believe this culture will continue to build slowly as we remain committed to this vision.

I am immensely thankful to the support of the ACS Board for their oversight, Mr Mark Nokes, Business Manager, for his financial advice, Mr Kym Golding, CEO, for his wisdom in difficult situations, the Executive Leadership Team, for their advice, and the many staff in Corporate Services who help me on a regular basis. I am most thankful to the staff in Naracoorte who do the valuable work of educating and supporting our students and families.

WHYALLA: A TOWN IN CRISIS

2024 has been marked by significant highlights, as well as moments that have showcased the courage and strong sense of community among the people of Whyalla.

A particularly challenging situation arose when our main industry, GFG Alliance (steelworks), faced a crisis when the blast furnace, the heart of the steelworks, experienced difficulties and ceased operations. This was compounded by the fact that many local businesses had not been paid for an extended period, which affected the town as a whole in a major way.

It was heartwarming and encouraging to see both the staff and the community come together, demonstrating resilience during this time of great uncertainty. Despite the challenges surrounding GFG and the significant number of our school families who lost jobs, we were able to maintain our student enrolment.

Fee assistance has been given to some of these affected families, enabling them to continue their Christian education uninterrupted.

It has been wonderful to witness our school shining as a beacon of hope in times of need and desperation.

Matthew 5:14 states "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden."

This verse, referring to ancient cities built on hills for defensive purposes, truly reflects our goal of remaining visible and impactful within our community. It has been heartwarming to hear visitors comment on the peacefulness of our site. All glory to God!

LIFE OF THE SCHOOL

Staff devotions have continued to be an essential and valued part of each school day. Being united in Christ through studies of various books of the Bible, including the Book of Jonah, as well as worship and prayer for events, the school community and students, has been uplifting and encouraging. Each day begins with themed devotions, such as exploring the Beatitudes and the Fruits of the Spirit.





Throughout the year, our staff continued to benefit from meaningful professional development. The four-day connection with the other Sunrise schools and the intensive face-toface personal development sessions at the start of the year provide excellent opportunities for further growth and learning. Additionally, we had the chance to participate in the CSA On-Demand PD (Christian Schools Australia), which allowed the staff at Whyalla to engage in further personal development from a Christian perspective.

Our Early Learning Centre (ELC) started the year strongly with a positive mindset. The students have actively participated in several school events throughout the year, including our Junior Primary Sports Day, where it was heartwarming to see the little ones racing towards the finish line during their sprints! We are focused on making the transition to school as smooth and easy as possible for our ELC students. One initiative that supports this is our 'Veggie Buddy' program, where the Grade 5 students visit the ELC to sow, plant and harvest vegetables together. The children particularly enjoy visiting our large chicken coop, which is home to numerous hens and a couple of roosters. Participating in other school-wide events, such as Grandparents' Day and Harmony Day, has also been a successful way to foster a sense of community and cohesion within the broader school environment.

Sport is an area where our students excel and enjoy participating in events such as Pedal Prix, netball. soccer, AFL, basketball and even finishing 4th in a mountain biking carnival. Our teams have consistently demonstrated both talent and sportsmanship, often being awarded with the team spirit award at combined school carnivals. The Junior Primary cohort participated in water safety and swimming lessons at the Whyalla Recreation Centre. Plans are in place to expand this initiative to include our Upper Primary students. We have been privileged to connect with the greater Sunrise community by joining the annual Upper Primary Athletics Carnival in Adelaide. It is a great opportunity for our country students to compete on this level with Adelaide and Naracoorte campuses. Additionally, our Grade 6-9 students participated in the UniSA Australian HPV Super Series (Pedal Prix). We currently have two vehicles, "Sunrisers" and "Cuttlerush". Our students were very competitive and achieved great results for our school at this fantastic event.

Celebrating and encouraging the development of creativity, and a love for music and theatre, has remained a focus for our school. We held a successful musical production titled "Jonah's Druthers". Our Grade 6 students showcased their singing and acting talents, with each primary class also performing a song on stage.

Music classes have continued to thrive, with Junior Primary students learning recorder, Upper Primary playing the ukulele, and Middle School mastering the guitar. A love for music has been fostered through weekly praise and worship times, assemblies and devotions. It's a blessing to provide the opportunity for our students to praise God boldly together. Our school are hosting Stormfront Production providing weekly private tutoring for a variety of musical instruments and vocal training. We once again participated in the Festival of Music, culminating in a mass combined schools choir performance at our local theatre.

The Grade 6 classes enjoyed a year filled with exciting leadership opportunities, including being appointed in Tech Support, Library Monitors, Sport Captains and School Captains' roles. The year concluded with the end-of-year formal dinner, a lovely celebration signifying the end of their Primary School years.

At Sunrise Whyalla, our Language Other Than English (LOTE) subject is Spanish. We utilise the Education Perfect online program to deliver the curriculum in an engaging way. A highlight of the year was our Spanish Day, giving the students the opportunity to dress in colourful Spanish outfits, participate in cultural games and activities, and sample delicious Spanish delicacies.

Beyond the schoolyard environment, we have enhanced our students' learning opportunities by offering exciting opportunities including excursions, incursions and our highly anticipated annual camps. Our Grade 3 class having a Friday night sleepover on the school grounds helps prepare them for their upcoming two-night stay at Adare in Victor Harbor in Grade 4. Although it's quite a distance for the Grade 4 students, this camp provides a valuable opportunity to learn about the First Fleet. Grade 5 students enjoyed a camping experience at Wirraway in the Adelaide Hills. Joining with two of our sister campuses promotes unity and friendship among our Sunrise locations.









Grade 6 students once again had the incredible opportunity to visit Canberra. This experience is key in enriching their understanding of Human and Social Sciences, as well as the Civics and Citizenship curriculum. Exploring locations such as Parliament House, the War Memorial and Questacon provides an invaluable experience that cannot be replicated.

Our Middle School students participated in two separate camps. Our 7th and 8th graders spent three days at West Beach for an Adelaide Adventure Camp, while our 9th and 10th graders camped for three days at Melrose in the Flinders Ranges.

The Grade 9 class engaged in the Rite Journey, a program designed to assist in their transition from youth to young adulthood. This program was facilitated by our dedicated staff, who not only highlighted the gifts and talents of the 9th graders but also guided them through this 'rite of passage' from childhood to adulthood, fostering a sense of purpose and a deep understanding of their identity in Christ.

The graduation of our Grade 6 and Grade 10 students was celebrated at our prestigious annual presentation evenings. The Grade 6 class looked so very grown up and mature in their graduation gowns and caps. Each one of the Grade 6 and Grade 10 students received a certificate and a gift from the school to celebrate this significant milestone in their lives. All students from Reception through to Grade 10 received certificates to acknowledge their character

and spiritual gifts and to celebrate outstanding achievements in the categories of sports, academics, character, performing arts and progress.

STAFFING

The staff at Sunrise Christian School exemplifies a deep and palpable faith in Christ, which profoundly influences their daily interactions with students. Their dedication to sharing this faith, particularly with those from non-believing families, is truly encouraging as they strive to bring precious lives into the Kingdom of God. Heartfelt stories, shared during our morning devotion times, highlight moments when students have come to Christ. These moments are celebrated by the entire staff, reinforcing the supportive and nurturing environment of our school. The staff actively partners with parents, maintaining constant communication through the Class Dojo app, ensuring that families feel connected and informed. Committed to the safety and wellbeing of all students, our staff

diligently prepares thorough risk management strategies through the Safety Management Online program, in preparation for all off site excursions and camps. Staff members are encouraged to use their strengths to invest in our students, resulting in a wide variety of opportunities for them and creating a secure environment where they can learn and grow. Staff members use platforms such as SEQTA and SharePoint to plan and manage data and assessments collected from students. Staff meetings were regularly held, alternating between full staff meetings and sub-school meetings. Personal development occurred during these meetings, including reflections and identification of areas for growth.

WORKPLACE HEALTH AND SAFETY

The safety and wellbeing of our students and staff is our top priority. Throughout the past year, we have made a strong commitment to fostering a secure learning environment. We have established a culture of safety that influences every part of our school community by strictly following updated fire safety procedures, providing first aid training, and enforcing mandatory reporting procedures. Our devoted staff continually work to implement and maintain these standards, ensuring that everyone in our community feels safe and supported.







DIVERSE EDUCATION

Our school is home to a wide variety of cultures and educational needs. Over the past year, we have welcomed an increasing number of students with diverse learning needs, prompting us to provide the necessary care and support. We are fortunate to have an outstanding Diverse Education team dedicated to helping teachers create Individual Learning Plans for every student who needs one. The flexibility of our staff has been encouraging, and many parents have expressed their appreciation for the nurturing environment our teachers and **Education Support Officers (ESOs)** provide for their children. It is truly a blessing to work alongside staff who put in tremendous effort to tailor each lesson, ensuring every child has the opportunity to learn and grow. Our MiniLit and Early Numeracy Intervention programs have been instrumental in helping teachers identify specific areas in each child's learning that require attention.

HIGHLIGHTS AND DEVELOPMENT FOR 2024

Whyalla

The beginning of 2024 saw a wonderful start with our Pre-kindy room being at almost capacity for majority of the week.

Playgroup continues to thrive as we saw that we were facilitating for between 15-25 families throughout 2024, with some of those children going onto joining our ELC or applying and waitlisted.

The barista program being utilised in playgroup has been enjoyed by families and staff. The waitlist has continued to grow specifically for 2 Year Olds and majority from our playgroup or word of mouth about the quality of care and education we offer.

In November we watched in anticipation as our new building landed which once approved and operating will see our waitlist decrease and number in enrolments increase.

We welcomed two adult trainees and had a staff member that



completed their training and attained their Diploma by the end of the year.

The Kindy children have enjoyed the new garden specialist visits and through their enthusiasm and creative ideas learned so many wonderful and exciting things, making the kitchen and garden program richer. The connection with the buddies is always a highlight for the children as they build strong connections with older peers.

We participated in school events such as Sports Day, Grandparents Day, Mother's Day, Father's Day. We look forward to the ongoing connections built between school and ELC.

Marion

2024 was a year of tremendous growth for Marion Early Learning Centre. A significant milestone for the year was the enrolment increase of 38 children, a testament to the centre's commitment to providing a nurturing and high-quality educational environment. This growth reflects the trust families have placed in us to care for and guide their children in these critical early years of development, from a biblical perspective. All Glory to God for His provision and protection!

The kindy children had a busy and enriching year, participating in weekly Buddy Lessons, as well as Music and Japanese lessons facilitated by the teachers at the school. The children were also invited to join the school for key events such as Well-Being Day, Sports Day, the Science Living-







Lab and an excursion to the South Australian Museum with the Reception class, offering them a variety of learning experiences throughout the year.

We celebrated the achievement of one of our trainees, who completed her Certificate III and transitioned to working toward her Diploma. Additionally, three other staff members were working toward their Certificate III, with each receiving dedicated support from individual mentors and training providers. This investment in staff development ensures that we continue to provide the best possible care and education for the children in our centre.

A key project in 2024 was the creation of a world map, connecting each child's photo to their country of origin. This interactive initiative involved families in a positive and inclusive way, and the completed

map became a frequent topic of discussion during drop-off and pick-up. It fostered a deeper sense of connection and cultural awareness within our community. This project will continue into 2025 as we further explore and embed our cultural diversity, in our daily activities.

As we move into the next year, we are excited to build on these foundations, continuing to support the developmental needs of every child, and strengthening the sense of belonging within our community. We are grateful for the trust and support of all families and look forward to another year of growth and development, with God as our anchor, provider and hope.

Paradise

We had a wonderful year of growth in 2024 where we were almost reaching capacity towards the later part of the year, with waitlist for some of the days. 

These are certainly deeply pleasing results and are a testament to the hard work and dedication of our students and staff over a number of years.

The College also had another highly successful year across our sporting teams, with 8 students selected to compete at State Titles in the

Wide Bay Surf Team and 7 students selected to compete at State Titles in Athletics and Cross Country.
